Your FBRA is once again trying to help those who live along the beach protect their property from the erosion of their beach and mitigate the topping of the beach by coastal storms--protecting all of our members.

Planting beach grasses and rugosa roses on the beach will catch wind drifting sand creating accretion and dunes. Sand dunes are a disposable but a delaying obstacles to coastal storm flooding. With a tide change every 6 hours even a small delay could reduce inland flooding and further beach erosion.

The Plan serves as a “roadmap” for preservation and growth over the next decade that guides the Town in making decisions related to housing, economic development, transportation, infrastructure, environmental resources, public facilities, open space, and historic and cultural resources.
